SIPG of NSU Hosts the International Conference on 'Rivers of South Asia: Connecting Ecology, People, and Governance'

The South Asian Institute of Policy and Governance (SIPG) at North South University (NSU) organized a two-day (22-23 July 2023) International Conference on 'Rivers of South Asia: Connecting Ecology, People, and Governance' in collaboration with the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS), Universiti Brunei Darussalam (UBD), and National River Conservation Commission (NRCC), Bangladesh at NSU's Syndicate Hall. Dr. Iqbal shed light on the intricate relationship between rivers, their cultural significance, and the policies necessary to balance ecological preservation and human development.
